

James Madison, President of the United States of America,
To all and singular to whom these Presents shall come,
Greeting:

Whereas a Treaty of Peace and friendship
between

between the United States of America and the Jarway Tribe
or Nation of Indians, was concluded & signed at Portage
des Sioux on the sixteenth day of September, one thousand
eight hundred & fifteen, by Commissioners on the part of
the said United States, and the King & certain Chiefs and Warriors
of the said Tribe or Nation of Indians, on behalf of said Tribe
or Nation of Indians, which Treaty is in the words following,
to wit:

A Treaty of Peace and Friendship, made and concluded between William Clark, Ninian Edwards and Auguste Chouteau Commissioners Plenipotentiary of the United States of America, on the part and behalf of the said States of the one part; and the undersigned King, Chiefs and Warriors of the Sauwag Tribe or nation, on the part and behalf of the said Tribe or nation, of the other part.

The Parties being desirous of re-establishing Peace and Friendship between the United States and the said Tribe or nation, and of being placed in all things and in every respect on the same footing upon which they stood before the war; have agreed to the following Articles.

Art; I. Every injury or act of hostility by one or either of the contracting parties against the other shall be mutually forgiven and forgot.

Art; II. There shall be perpetual Peace and Friendship between all the Citizens of the United States and all the individuals composing the said Sauwag Tribe or nation.

Art; III. The ^{Parties} ~~Contracting~~ hereby agree ~~mutually~~ and oblige themselves, reciprocally to deliver up all the Prisoners now in their hands (by what means soever the same may have come into their Possession); to the Officer commanding at ~~Fort Clark~~ ^{St. Louis} ~~at the Missouri~~, to be by him restored to their respective Nations, as soon as it may be practicable.

Art; IV. The Contracting Parties in the sincerity of mutual Friendship recognize, reestablish and confirm all and every Treaty, Contract and Agreement, heretofore concluded between the United States and the said Sauwag Tribe or nation.

In Witness whereof, the said William Clark, Ninian Edwards and Auguste Chouteau Commissioners as aforesaid, and the aforesaid King, Chiefs and Warriors, have hereunto subscribed their names and affixed their seals this Sixteenth day of September in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and Fifteen and of the Independence of the United States the Fortieth.

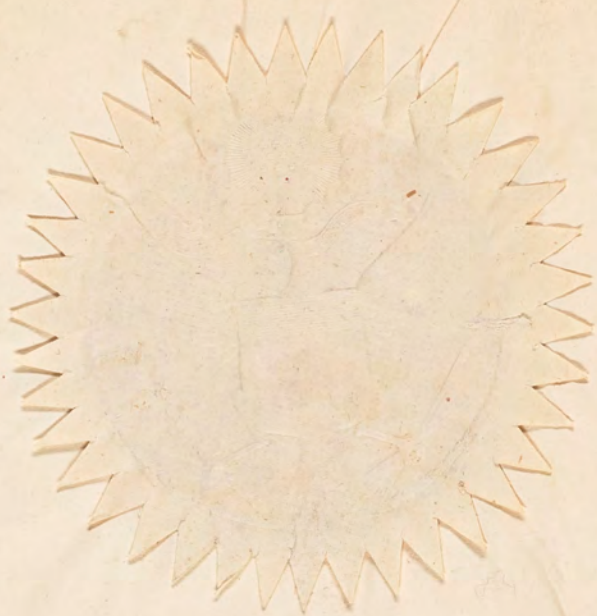
Now, therefore, be it known, that I, James Madison,

Washington this twenty sixth
