Art. I. Every Injury or Act of Hostility committed by one or either of the contracting parties against the other shall be mutually forgiven and forgot.

Art. II. There shall be perpetual Peace and Friendship between all the Citizens of the United States of America and all the Individuals comprising the Tribe of Sioux of the River St. Peter's, and all the Friendly relations that existed between them before the war, shall be and the same are hereby renewed.

Art. III. The undersigned Chiefs and Warriors for themselves and their said Tribe do hereby acknowledge themselves and their Tribe to be under the Protection of the United States and of no other, Power Nation or Sovereign whatsoever.
