Whereas a Treaty of Peace and friendship between the
 United States of America and the Sioux Tribe or Nation
 of

of Indians was concluded and signed at Portage des
Sioux on the Nineteenth day of July in the year one
thousand eight hundred & fifteen, by Commissioners on
the part of the said United States, and certain Chiefs &
Warriors of the said Tribe or Nation of Indians, on the
part of the said Tribe or Nation, which Treaty is in the
words following, to wit:

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A Treaty of Peace and Friendship made and concluded between William Clark,
Ninian Edwards and Auguste Chouteau Commissioners Plenipotentiary of the United States of America, on the
part and behalf of the said States of the one part, and the undersigned Chiefs and Warriors of the Sioux of the
Lakes, on the part and behalf of their Tribe, of the other Part.

The parties being desirous of reestablishing Peace and Friendship between the United States and the
said Tribe, and of being placed in all things and in every respect on the same footing upon which they stood before
the late War between the United States and Great Britain, have agreed to the following Articles.

Art. I. Every injury or act of hostility committed by one or either of the contracting parties against the other shall be
mutually forgiven and forgot.

Art. II. There shall be perpetual Peace and Friendship between all the Citizens of the United States of
America, and all the Individuals composing the said Tribe of the Lakes, and all the friendly relations
that existed between them before the war, shall be and the same are hereby renewed.

Art. III. The undersigned Chiefs and Warriors for themselves and their said Tribe, do hereby acknowledge themselves
and their aforesaid Tribe to be under the protection of the United States, and of no other Nation, Power or
Sovereign whatsoever.

In Witness whereof the said William Clark, Ninian Edwards and Auguste
Chouteau Commissioners aforesaid and the Chiefs and Warriors of the aforesaid Tribe have hereunto subscribed
their names and affixed their Seals this Nineteenth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight
hundred and fifteen and of the Independence of the United States the Twentieth.

President of the United States of America, having seen and
considered the said Treaty, have, by & with the advice
and consent of the Senate, accepted, ratified and
confirmed the same, and every clause and article thereof.

and have signed the same with
my hand. Done at the City of
Washington this twenty-first
day of December A.D. One
thousand eight hundred & fifteen
