

James Madison, President of the United States of America,
To all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting:
Whereas a Treaty of Peace and Friendship
between

between the United States of America and the Deetson Tube
or Nation of Indians, was concluded and signed at Portage des
Scouts on the Nineteenth day of July, one thousand
eight hundred & fifteen, by Commissioners on the part
of the said United States, and certain Chiefs and Warriors of
the said Tube or Nation of Indians, on the part of the said
Tube or Nation, which Treaty is in the words following, to
wit:

A Treaty of Peace and Friendship made and concluded, between William Clark, Miriam Edwards and Auguste Chouteau Commissioners Plenipotentiary of the United States of America on the part and behalf of the said States of the one part, and the undersigned Chiefs and Warriors of the Teton Tribe of Indians on the part and behalf of their said Tribe, of the other Part.

The Parties being desirous of reestablishing Peace and Friendship, between the United States and the said Tribe; and of being placed in all things and in every respect, on the same footing upon which they stood before the late War between the United States and Great Britain, have agreed to the following Articles.

Art. I. Every injury or act of hostility committed by one or either of the contracting parties against the other, shall be mutually forgiven and forgot.

Art. II. There shall be perpetual Peace and Friendship between all the Citizens of the United States of America, and all the Individuals composing the said Nation, Tribe, and the friendly relations that existed between them before the war shall be and the same are hereby renewed.

Art. III. The undersigned Chiefs and Warriors for themselves and their said Tribe do hereby acknowledge themselves and their aforesaid Tribe to be under the Protection of the United States of America, and of no other Nation, Power or Sovereign whatsoever.

In Witness whereof the said William Clark, Ninian Edwards and Auguste Chouteau Commissioners as aforesaid, and the Chiefs and Warriors of the said Tribe, have hereunto subscribed their names and affixed their seals this nineteenth Day of July One thousand Eight Hundred and fifteen and of the Independence of the United States the Twentieth.

Treaty with the Tecumseh

Tribute or Action of Indians,
Dated July 19. 1815.
Ratified Dec 26. 1815.

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Recd

Now, therefore, be it known, that I, James Madison,
President of the United States of America, having seen
and considered the said Treaty, have, by & with the
advice and consent of the Senate, accepted, ratified and
confirmed the same, and every clause and article
thereof.

In Testimony whereof, I have
caused the Seal of the United States
to be hereunto affixed, and have
signed the same with my Hand.
Done at the City of Washington
this Twenty sixth day of December
A.D. one thousand eight hundred
& fifteen, & of the Independence
of the United States the fortieth.
