To all and singular to whom these Presents shall come—
Greeting.

Whereas a Treaty of Peace and Friendship
between the United States of America and the Pitavirate
Hoisy Pawnee Tribe of Indians, was made and concluded
at St. Louis, on the 19th day of June, in the year of our
Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighteen, by com-
missioners on the part of the said United States, and
certain Chiefs and Warriors of the said Tribe, on the
part and in behalf of the said Tribe, which Treaty is in
the words following, to wit:

A Treaty

A Treaty of Peace and Friendship made and concluded by and between William Clark and Auguste Chouteau, Commissioners of the United States of America, on the part and behalf of the said States of the one part; And the undersigned Chiefs and Warriors of the ^{Plains} Noisy Pawnee Tribe, on the part and behalf of their said Tribe of the other part.

The parties being desirous of Establishing Peace and Friendship between the United States and the said Tribe, have agreed to the following Articles.

- Art: I Every injury or act of hostility by one, or either of the contracting Parties against the other shall be mutually forgiven and forgot
- Art: II There shall be perpetual Peace and Friendship between all the Citizens of the United States of America, and all the individuals composing the said Noisy Pawnee Tribe.
- Art: III The undersigned Chiefs and Warriors for themselves and their said Tribe, do hereby acknowledge themselves to be under the protection of the United States of America, and of no other Nation, Power, or Sovereign whatsoever.
- Art: IV The undersigned Chiefs and Warriors, for themselves and the Tribe they represent, do moreover, promise and oblige themselves to deliver up, or cause to be delivered up to the authority of the United States (to be punished according to law) each and every individual of the said Tribe who shall at any time hereafter violate the stipulations of the Treaty this day concluded between the said Noisy Pawnee Tribe and the said States.

In Witness Whereof the said William Clark and Auguste Chouteau Commissioners as aforesaid, and the Chiefs and Warriors aforesaid have herunto subscribed their names and affixed their seals this nineteenth day of June in the Year of our Lord, one thousand Eight hundred and Eighteen, and of the Independence of the United States the Forty Second.
