President of the United States of America,

To all and singular to whom these Presents shall come,
Greeting.

Whereas a Treaty of Peace and Friend-
ship between the United States of America and the Me-
nominee Tribe or Nation of Indians, was concluded and
signed at St. Louis, in the Missouri Territory, on the thir-
tieth day of March, in the year of our Lord one Thou-
sand Eight Hundred and seventeen, by Commissioners on the
part of the said United States and certain Chiefs and War-
riors of the said Tribe or Nation, on the part and in be-
half of the said Tribe or Nation; which Treaty is in the
words following, to wit:

A Treaty

A Treaty of Peace and Friendship made and concluded, by and between William Clark, Minian Edwards and Auguste Chouteau, Commissioners on the part and behalf of the United States of America, of the one part, and the undersigned Chiefs and Warriors deputed by the Menomence Tribe or Nation of Indians, on the part and behalf of their said Tribe or Nation of the other part.

The Parties being desirous of reestablishing Peace and Friendship between the United States and the said Tribe or Nation, and of being placed in all things and in every respect on the same footing upon which they stood before the late war, have agreed to the following Articles.

- Art. Ist; Every injury or act of hostility by one or either of the contracting parties against the other, shall be mutually forgiven and forgot.
- Art. IInd; There shall be perpetual Peace and Friendship between all the Citizens of the United States, and all the individuals composing the said Menomence Tribe or Nation.
- Art. IIIrd; The undersigned Chiefs and Warriors, on the part and behalf of their said Tribe or Nation, do by these Presents, confirm to the United States all and every cession of land heretofore made by their Tribe or Nation, to the British, French or Spanish Government, within the limits of the United States or their Territories; and also all and every Treaty, contract and Agreement heretofore concluded between the said United States and the said Tribe or Nation.
- Art. IVth; The contracting parties do hereby agree, promise and oblige themselves reciprocally, to deliver up all prisoners now in their hands, (by what means soever the same may have come into their possession) to the Officer commanding at Prairie du Chien, to be by him restored to the respective parties hereto, as soon as it may be practicable.
- Art. Vth; The undersigned Chiefs and Warriors as aforesaid, for themselves and those they represent, do hereby acknowledge themselves to be under the protection of the United States, and of no other Nation, Power or Sovereign whatsoever.

In Witness whereof, the Commissioners aforesaid, and the undersigned Chiefs and Warriors as aforesaid, have herewith subscribed their names and affixed their seals this thirtieth day of March, in the year of

✓ Resolved, two thirds of the Senators present concurring therein, That the Senate do advise and consent to the ratification of the Treaty of peace and friendship made and concluded at St. Louis, the twenty-fourth day of June in the year 1817, between the United States and the Ottos tribe of Indians.

✓ Resolved, two thirds of the Senators present concurring therein, That the Senate do advise and consent to the ratification of the Treaty of peace and friendship made and concluded at St. Louis, on the 25.th day of June 1817, between the United States and the chiefs and warriors of the Poncarar tribe of Indians.

✓ Resolved, two thirds of the Senators present concurring therein, That the Senate do advise and consent to the ratification of the Treaty made and concluded at the Cherokee Agency, the 8.th day of July A. D. 1817, between the United States and the Chiefs, head men and

warriors of the Cherokee nation east of the Mississippi
river, and the chiefs, head men and warriors of the Cherokees
on the Arkansas river.
