of Indians residing on the Wisconsin River was concluded
and signed at St. Louis, in the Missouri Territory, on the
third day of June, in the year one thousand, eight hundred
and sixteen, by Commissioners on the part of the said United
States, and certain Chiefs or Warriors of the said Indian
Nation, on the part and in behalf of the said Tribe or Nation
which Treaty is in the words following, to wit:

A Treaty of Peace and Friendship made and concluded between William Clark, Simon Edwards and Auguste Chouteau Commissioners Plenipotentiary of the United States of America, on the part and behalf of the said States of the one part; and the undersigned Chiefs and Warriors of that portion of the Winnebago Tribe or Nation residing on the Wisconsin river, of the other part.

Whereas, the undersigned Chiefs and Warriors, as well as that portion of the nation which they represent, have separated themselves from the rest of their Nation and reside in a village on the Wisconsin river, and are desirous of returning to a state of friendly relations with the United States, the parties hereto have agreed to the following Articles.

Art. I; Every injury or act of hostility committed by one or either of the contracting parties against the other, shall be mutually forgiven and forgot; and all the friendly relations that existed between them before the late war shall be, and the same are hereby renewed.

Art. II; The undersigned Chiefs and Warriors for themselves and those they represent do by these Presents, confirm to the United States all and every cession of Land heretofore made by their ~~own~~ Nation to the British, French or Spanish Government, within the limits of the United States or their Territories; and also, all and every Treaty, Contract and Agreement, heretofore concluded between the United States and the said Tribe or Nation, - as far as their interest in the same extends.

Art. III. The undersigned Chiefs and Warriors as aforesaid, for themselves and those they represent, do hereby acknowledge themselves to be under the protection of the United States, and of no other Nation, Power or Government whatsoever.

Art. IVth

The aforesaid chiefs and warriors, for themselves and those they represent, do further promise to remain distinct and separate from the rest of their tribe or nation, giving them no aid or assistance whatever, until Peace shall also be concluded between the United States and the said Tribe or Nation.

Art. Vth

The contracting parties do hereby agree, promise and oblig themselves reciprocally, to deliver up all Prisoners now in their hands (by what means soever the same may have come into their possession); to the Officer commanding at Prairie du Chien, to be by him restored to the respective parties hereto, as soon as it may be practicable.

In Witness whereof, the Commissioners aforesaid, and the undersigned chiefs and warriors as aforesaid, have hereunto subscribed their names and affixed their seals this third day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixteen and of the Independence of the United States the fourth.

every clause and article thereof.

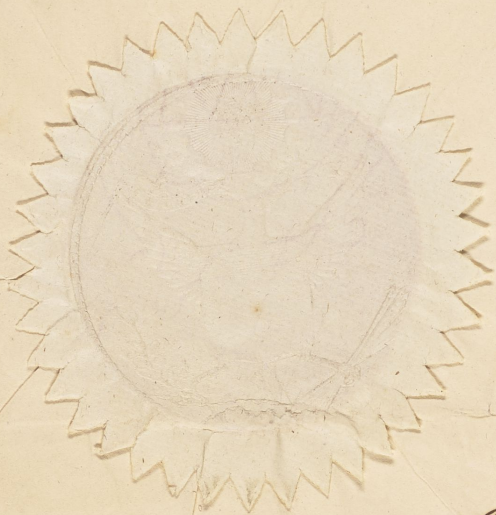
